The Hall of Fame Award is awarded to an adult who has been a member for at least 25 years, who has delivered service that far exceeds the expectation of any position that has had a lasting impact on the Girl Scout organization or her/his community. This award will be presented a maximum of 10 people per year, and may be awarded posthumously.



Thomas Courtney can celebrate 50 years as a Girl Scout volunteer! He has been a council trainer for nearly half that time, training hundreds of adult volunteers in first aid/CPR. He has helped with troop events and supported service unit activities, including doing public relations work to get community organizations and businesses to support Girl Scouting financially.
